

On or about 20th of September, 2007, I was talking with some people on issues [regarding the Town of Orono School Union 87], and one made a comment that the Asa Adams Elementary School had a little boy who was being treated as a little girl at [the child's] request.

Upon further checking into this matter it was determined there was in fact a little boy posing as a little girl and using the girls restroom. On or about September 26, 2007, I called the [Asa Adams Elementary] school and talked with [Superintendent] Mr. Kelly Clenchy about this.

I was assured this was not happening, but [was told] there was such a child whom used the teacher's restroom. On October 2, 2007, my grandson informed me that this practice was still going on. I gave my grandson permission to use the girl's restroom, if the other little boy was still using the girl's restroom.

On October 4, 2007, he used the girl's restroom. Upon leaving the restroom, he was taken to the Principal's office and read the riot act.

I told her I would take [the matter] up with Principal. I went to the school and met with Mr. Lucy. I was told my grandsons behavior was unacceptable, and if he didn't want to "have a bad year," he should refrain from such practices.

I informed Mr. Lucy of Maine's [2005] anti-discrimination law protecting people from discrimination in public accommodations for sexual orientation and gender. He was not concerned with this. He told me the [Asa Adams Elementary] school had policies for "special-needs children."

On October 5, 2007, two [Town of Orono] police officers came to my home. I was told again my actions were unacceptable and trouble would follow if I didn't stop. I also informed the police officers of the law on discrimination, and again I was told to back off my practice of making a point.

After thirty minutes [of discussion with the police officers], I agreed to "back off," if this student ceased his practice also. I was assured this would happen.

It is now December 5, 2007, and this practice has not stopped. I have gotten nowhere.
